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Mother Accused of Poisoning Son Is Found Guilty

Lacey Spears, the mother accused of poisoning her son with salt, has been found guilty of murder.

Her son Garnett passed away last January after being hospitalized with what appeared to be the flu. When doctors discovered he had dangerously high levels of sodium in his system, they called the police.

Spears documented her son's health issues at length on social media, from the moment he was born. Garnett struggled with mystery illnesses for which his mom sought treatment as she moved across the country.

"Making your son sick for attention is horrible," sophomore Maya Stern said.

She gained a nationwide following and sympathy for her son. When he died on 23 January 2014, the outpouring of condolences was overwhelming—until Spears was arrested for his murder.

Lacey loved the attention and sympathy she received from having a "sick" child. Although Garnett did have his issues, he was not sick until his mother made him

sick. Spears continues to say that she is innocent and had no reason to murder her son.

What there is evidence of, however, is a feeding bag prosecutors believe Spears used to hold the salt. She then tried to hide while she was at the hospital with her son. A neighbor told police Spears called her and told her to get rid of the bag in question. It was later tested and found to have extremely high levels of sodium.

"The woman was clearly guilty. There was more than enough evidence supporting that fact. Her search history showed results leading to tests dealing with sodium. How she was not convicted or found guilty until now amazes me," sophomore Logan Carbaugh said.

Spears's Internet search history showed that she had been looking up the dangers of sodium. As an infant, Garnett was treated for salt poisoning. She is still trying to prove her innocence despite the evidence.

Beneful Rejects Claims of Unsafe Ingredients

An action lawsuit filed 5 February 2015 in U.S. District Court for the Northern District of California claims that certain ingredients in the dry dog food Beneful from Nestlé Purina PetCare Company have sickened or killed thousands of dogs.

"The lawsuit has raised questions among those with pets," one veterinarian

said. She advised those who are concerned to be aware of common poisoning symptoms and bring any concerns to their family vet.



company's director of corporation communications said. "Like other pet foods, Beneful is occasionally the subject of social media-driven misinformation. Online postings often contain false, unsupported and misleading allegations that cause undue concern and confusion for our Beneful customers. Bottom line: Consumers can continue to

feed Beneful with total confidence."

In the dog food, there is an ingredient called propylene glycol. Propylene glycol is a known animal toxin and a com-

ponent of antifreeze. However, the company says that the type it uses is FDA-approved and is also used in human foods, including salad dressing and cake mix.

If your dog has any of these symptoms from eating the food, take him/her to the vet as soon as possible.

- Decreased activity or appetite
- Vomiting
- Diarrhea (sometimes with blood)
- Increased thirst
- Increased urination

Frank Lucido of Discovery Bay, California, says in the complaint that, after his family began feeding their three dogs Beneful late in December 2014 and early January of this year, all of them became ill and one has died. An official with Nestlé Purina called the lawsuit "baseless" and said that two earlier action lawsuits making similar allegations had been dismissed by the courts.

Beneful had the following to say in a media press release.

"We believe the lawsuit is baseless, and we intend to vigorously defend ourselves and our brand," Bill Salzman, the

Hunter Zagorski entered the realm of Fleetwood Area High School this year.


Hunter was born on 12 July 1998 in Warsaw, Poland. The first school he attended was Shiloh Hills.

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Another NHL Trade Deadline Passes

The NHL trade deadline, and the weeks prior to it, usually brings out an uproar of activity for many teams. Teams are either making a final push to secure a playoff spot or hoping to go deep into the playoffs attempt to trade to acquire key veterans or goal scorers in order to fill empty spots in their rosters.

"The NHL trade line is one of my favorite parts of the season. Hearing the trade rumors and seeing who goes where and who gets what," senior Michael Scott Osenbach said.

Teams that are rebuilding with younger players may be willing to trade away their more expensive players in order to free up salary cap space and get draft picks/prospects in return as well as getting cheaper players with more potential.

"Teams always kind of go into desperation mode when they're right on the outside of the playoff picture and are looking forward to the future and getting good, young prospects on entry level contracts so they can get them without taking a huge salary-cap hit," Osenbach said.

Players on playoff-contending teams who are injured or who are not able to return for the current season may be offered to teams that are rebuilding because they will be of no value or use to a team's playoff push.

"Everyone wants to win the cup; it's not like football, where you have your own trophy. It gets taken from you every year before playoffs, and you have to fight to get it back. You have to potentially play twenty-one games to bring the cup back to your city," sophomore Brodrick Allen said.

Prospects in the current season that may be of value to another team for future seasons could potentially be traded as

well, even players that are not in the NHL.

"There are a ton of young guys that are on some of the farm teams in the OHL or the QMJHL. They are probably going to light it up in the NHL. Tons of promising guys are coming up," senior Gary Gabriel said.

Also, players who are about to become unrestricted free agents and have indicated that they do not intend to return to their current teams may be traded away so that those teams will get something in

return instead of seeing such players sign with another team while their former teams receive nothing.

"The deadline is so exciting because it's not just no-name players that no one has ever heard of being traded. Guys that are 'hometown heroes' and fan favorites get traded every year," Gabriel said.

The Philadelphia Flyers traded arguably one of their top defensemen, Kimmo Timonen, to the Chicago Blackhawks. The Flyers acquired two draft picks for Timonen, who was injured frequently over the season.

"You never want to see a guy like Kimmo get traded because he plays solid defense and is a leader on and off the ice for the team. He was a good veteran. He just had trouble staying healthy, and that kept him out of the lineup. I wish him the best of luck in Chicago. It's a great hockey city, and he'll be playing with some of the best forwards in the league. They'll make a solid run for the cup," Allen said.

The NHL trade deadline was on 2 March at 6:00 p.m. eastern time. At that time, any player traded after the deadline was ineligible to play in the Stanley Cup Playoffs if their team makes it.

"I'm ready for some playoff Hockey; it's the best," senior Lizzay Faust said.

They medaled in five other events, including one second place, two third places, and two fourth places.

Eagles Acquire New Talent

The Philadelphia Eagles made a lot of moves this offseason. Some people may question the moves while others support them.

The Eagles started the offseason off by signing former Seattle Seahawks cornerback Byron Maxwell to a six-year, \$60 million contract.

Next, the Eagles traded their Franchise leading rusher LeSean McCoy to the Bills for Linebacker Kiko Alonso who was injured all of the 2014 season with an ACL injury.

The Eagles' next move was to trade their starting quarterback Nick Foles to the Rams for injured Quarterback Sam Bradford.

Sam Bradford's career stats at the Rams were 11,065 passing yards with 59 Passing Touchdowns and 38 interceptions.

Nick Foles' Career Passing stats with the Eagles are 6,753 Passing Yards with 46 Passing Touchdowns while only throwing 17 interceptions. He also was the second best in NFL history in 2013 with a Passer rating of 119.2.

The next move the Eagles made was letting go of their leading receiver Jeremy Maclin. He returned to his hometown of Kansas City to join the Chiefs.

The Eagles then acquired another

replacement to the cornerback position, which was one of the league's worst last year. They signed Walter Thurmond to a one-year deal from the Giants, who was injured almost all of last season.

The Eagles then signed Free Agent running back Ryan Mathews to a three year, \$12 million deal. He was a member of the Chargers last season.

The Eagles then next signed the best free agent on the market this off-season as they signed free agent Demarco Murray.

Murray signed a five-year \$42 million deal. He was the league's leading rusher last year and is exactly what the Eagles needed to replace LeSean McCoy.

"I think it's great what the Eagles are doing," senior and longtime Eagles fan Matt Hook said.

The Eagles now have three starting running backs on their roster: Murray, Mathews, and Sprioles. Reporters are starting to call the trio M&M'S, or "The Legion of Zoom" as a spinoff on Seattle's "Legion of Boom."

Whatever happens during the off-season, the Eagles are going to have to put it all together if they want to make a run at the Super Bowl.


